




## Beginning Fiction Winner

Join an adventurous young astronaut as he searches for signs of life on the planet Mars. Confident that he will find someone to accept his gift of chocolate cupcakes, the boy grows increasingly despondent



as he wanders across the apparently barren landscape, blithely unaware of his surroundings -particularly the giant, pear-shaped Martian who is following him. Young readers will be delighted by the visual humor and being in on the secret, as the intrepid astronaut climbs over the unseen alien and returns to his spaceship only to find another mystery to solve. Agee's clear, stylized illustrations and short, easy-to-read sentences make this book an accessible, appealing pageturner.



#### If Sharks Disappeared

Lily Williams Roaring Brook Press, 2017



Sharks may seem scary, but they play a critical role in the ocean ecosystem, as Lily Williams demonstrates with this powerful pack-

age of scientific explanation and vivid illustration. With a young girl as our guide, the reader is carried down the food chain to see what oceans might look like without any sharks: empty, sludge-colored, and dismal. Complex vocabulary like "apex predator" and "trophic cascade" is well-explained in both straightforward text and rich, accessible back matter, while bright, simple pictures provide transitional readers with another level of understanding. After reading this book, kids will appreciate sharks as much more than terrifying jaws and teeth!
